## INTENT

At Pickhurst, Philosophy for Children (P4C) and Citizenship are delivered with the intention that they enhance and enrich all other subjects taught across our varied curriculum, thus allowing our pupils to develop and move on to secondary school as truly accomplished, confident citizens of the world. There are many ways in which our children are supported to live out these values through the ethos of the classroom, relationships and the content of the school's curriculum. We ensure many cultural capital opportunities are woven into the school timetable to allow P4C and Citizenship to impact meaningfully on pupils' learning and development, including school council meetings, assemblies, educational trips, visitors, events such as Careers Week and Enterprise Week and most importantly through the culture and ethos that the school creates. As a local community and as a nation, it is our responsibility to help pupils connect to the British values. Through Citizenship, we provide lessons, events and resources to show them how they are invested in these values. We explore how to make choices and celebrate diversity, similarities and differences, resulting in a sense of belonging for all. The 'fundamental British values' that the DfE and Ofsted are asking schools to promote and which our Citizenship programme follows are: democracy, rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

Social development and self-growth is achieved as pupils learn to engage with and contribute meaningfully to life in Britain, modelling key attributes such as tolerance, friendship, kindness and understanding. We also encourage money sense – fostering an importance of economy and our role as workers and contributors within society. We aim for pupils to leave Pickhurst with a secure, practical knowledge of how money works, as well as recognising the financial and mental health impact of money in everyday life and what support is available. We live in an ever-changing and often challenging modern world. Our pupils come from many cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds and P4C is a forum that helps them develop their critical thinking intellectually, socially, morally, emotionally and culturally. At Pickhurst our aim is to explore new ideas, allow pupils to challenge themselves and others and to question the status quo in a respectful and appropriate way during P4C sessions. They can then apply these skills to other lessons and contexts, for example using sentence starters such as "I respectfully disagree with...because in my opinion..." in English or Maths discussions. Our school understands that a majority opinion or mindset may not be 'best' or 'correct' and that open questioning and 'out of the box' thinking is vital when challenging stereotypes and cultivating creative viewpoints.

The intention is for all pupils to have the opportunity to tackle complex, and at times difficult, life issues in a safe, nurturing space where speaking and listening skills are continually built upon and positive self- esteem allows them to take part in making and changing rules. At Pickhurst, P4C aims to encourage children to think critically, caringly, creatively and collaboratively. The children build a 'community of enquiry' where they create and enquire into their own questions. The questions raised come from a stimulus that is shared with the children. The stimulus can take the form of objects, artefacts, pictures, photographs and videos, providing a snapshot of the wider world, cultures, concepts and mindsets. At Pickhurst, pupils are immersed in a culture of acceptance, fairness, self-awareness and 'looking beyond' to explore and question the main events, ideas and political and social institutions that affect their lives. Our school ethos supports children thinking for themselves and fostering conviction in their attitude and opinions. They recognise the differences between a debate and a discussion; where support, encouragement and open-mindedness are key factors to success. It is essential that children understand the concept of community and belonging in all forms, from the school setting to the wider world. We champion acceptance and equality for all. Pupils are given a voice as well as the tools and life skills needed to make their ideas and opinions heard, in line with freedom of speech.
